McKinley Hill's Remarkable Trees



If there's one thing we like to share with new supporters of the Foundation. it's that wondrous trees can also be found on your sidewalk. And this was certainly confirmed as we explored McKinley Hill's sidewalks: Norway Maple, Flowering Dogwood, Mimosa, Paper Birch, and Black Locust are all among the trees that shade McKinley's streets. One of our favorites, though, is this "Cake Tree" or Katsura Tree, a deciduous tree that gets its playful name from the scent of sweet oven-baked bread that its leaves release when fall arrives. The scent is produced by the maltol molecule. It is the perfect tree to accompany the freshly baked Yeastside donuts and LUX brewed coffee that participants were able to enjoy!

WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

You might already know that in partnership with the City of Tacoma Urban Forestry Program, we are holding_our first planting program of the season in McKinley Hill on October 14, which is also <u>Green Tacoma Day</u>! To celebrate, we organized two different tree walks in this great Tacoma neighborhood.

Did you know McKinley Hill rests on a watershed? In fact, its park has four streams and four wetlands! Those who joined our Nature Explorers walk on August 24 learned about this space, deemed a "park of significance" by the City. We learned about the trees and the creatures that call it home, and participants pointed in wonder at the species they learned how to recognize from expert arborist and TTF founder, Sarah Low.

As usual, we had great conversations with Hilltop residents, and passersby visiting from other Tacoma neighborhoods, Lakewood, and University Place. Many of our conversations focused on community concerns about tree removal and development. As we move into planting season, these issues are on our mind. The urban forest needs young trees to grow, and we need established trees, which give us the most benefits!

Our fall fundraiser starts TODAY! Since our foundation in 2018. we have delivered over 10.000 trees to neighborhoods in the City of Tacoma and the greater urban area

thanks to your support. We have accomplished this by borrowing our partners' vehicles and using our personal trucks. But once planted, young trees need our help-from June to October, they need an average of 15-20 gallons of water a week, and their health and growth must be monitored year-round. With \$25,000, we will be able to buy a truck, so we can water every tree, exactly when it is needed! 
